Renowned decorator Brian J. McCarthy shares his muses of the moment

CELEBRATED NEW York-based interior designer and author of two books, Brian J. McCarthy has created interiors for a football-field-sized yacht, a Virginia horse farm, a Monte Carlo penthouse, and even the official residence of the Ambassador to the Court of St. James in London. What—and who—is inspiring him right now?

“For me, art is an incredibly important element and layer in any project. And I don’t just mean art that hangs on the wall,” says McCarthy. “Art can also be in the furniture and objects that one chooses.”

“A young artist whose work I’m currently crazy for is Keltie Ferris,” he says. She’s known for her mostly large-scale canvases covered with layers of spray paint and hand-painted geometric fields. Ferris also uses her body to press natural oils and pigments against canvas in a series of self-portraits she calls body prints.

“When it comes to furniture as art, I love the work of Maria

Pergay, who creates sexy furniture in steel,” McCarthy explains. This Paris-born furniture designer incorporates luxurious materials like mother-of-pearl, lacquer, and wood materials in her evolving, dream-like designs. Other patrons of her work include Pierre Cardin and the Saudi royal family.

Among his other current favorites are “ceramics that practically represent a small cosmic explosion by Gareth Mason.” Mason is known for original, transformational ceramics, and his work goes through a series of metamorphoses and manipulations—multiple firings, glazings, and the addition of materials like gravel or waste scavenged from the Thames—before becoming a genuine piece of art. This British designer works to capture and condense explosions of color, density, and texture.
